## SALUTO DEL PRESIDE DELL'INSTITUTUM CARMELITANUM, P. PATRICK McMAHON

generations of scholars, both Carmelites and friends of Carmel. *Carmelus* plays a very important role in this mission as it is our chief organ of bringing that research out into the eye of those who are seriously interested in *re carmelitana*: scholars, members of the Carmelite Family, and those who have looked to Carmel to anchor their lives in a tested and true spiritual tradition. For all that has been for these past fifty years we are profoundly thankful, and for all that can be in the future of Carmelite Studies, we are filled with great hope. To those men, both living and deceased, who have been part of what has been, we offer our homage, and to those men and women who will be part of our future, we extend a welcoming hand to come and join us in our work.
